





1010-1040 Tim Harrison (BTO Garden BirdWatch)

'Why gardens and local garden birdwatchers matter'

Gardens encompass a land area that is greater than National and RSPB Nature Reserves combined and support important wildlife populations. In our increasingly urbanising landscape, gardens also form an important link between people and the natural world. Tim Harrison explores the increasingly important role of gardens in our lives, and reveals garden bird highlights of South Wales.

'Recording moths in your garden'

Although most species of moth have been in decline for many years, you can still find moths in your garden wherever you live. Norman will show how to attract moths into the garden and how to identify and to record them.

'The Cardiff Garden Wildlife Survey'

Rob will present results of the Wildlife Trust's Cardiff Garden Wildlife Survey and will outline how householders can take part in other ways to survey for garden wildlife.

'Power from the Severn: good or bad for birds?'

Schemes to harness the power of the tide in the Severn Estuary have been suggested since the 18th century. Since the 1980s, the BTO has been involved in a number of studies into the potential impacts on birds, the most recent concluding last year. We will discuss the likely impact of a barrage.

'Positioning of garden bird feeders'

Where you position your bird feeders in the garden may affect how much they are used and which species use them. Ecologist at Cardiff University, Richard Cowie, will summarise research conducted in Cardiff gardens exploring some of these issues.

'Nature's greatest pollinators'

The bumblebees in your garden: long tongues or short tongues and big jaws; working from before dawn until after sunset in most weathers; what they are doing for you and what you can do for them?

1430-1500 Steve Lucas (Bat Conservation Trust)

'The Urban Bat Survey Project: exploring the secrets of the night'

Green urban spaces are often said to be good for bats but is that really true? With increasing urbanisation and pressure for land-use change, it is important to get a better understanding of what bat species occupy the urban landscape and how they use this environment.

1530-1600 Tim Harrison (BTO Garden BirdWatch) 'Make your garden count!'


